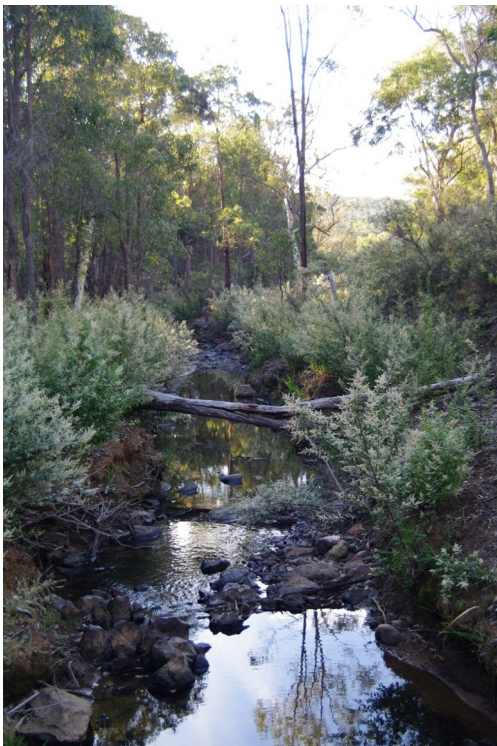

This picturesque walk trail meanders beside Piesse Brook on a return trip of 3.4kms

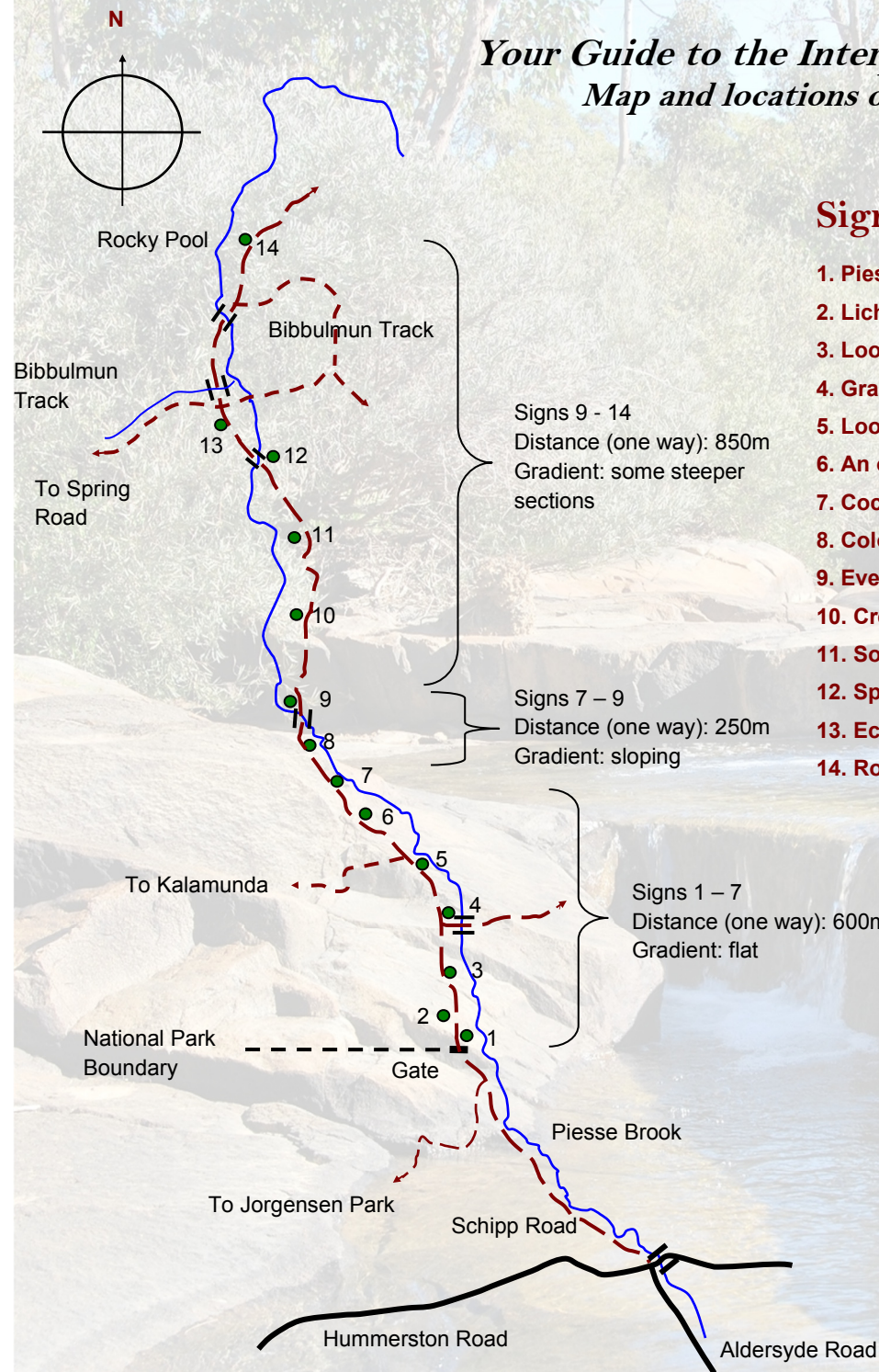
